Sukkot

Concepts: Fall harvest

Symbols/Customs: Sukkah, Lulav, Etrog

Props: sukkah & leaves; laminated fruit & vegetables, tools and lulavs; fruit shakers, Barry Bear and Shubi Dubi (stuffed animal friends for the sukkah).

Tips for Teaching This Unit:

1. We are celebrating a very happy holiday called Sukkot. Talk about what we do on Sukkot: build a sukkah, shake lulav and smell etrog. Sing **Chag Sukkot** with percussion instruments. Age appropriate for all preschoolers.

Chag Sukkot

Chorus:

Chag Sukkot, chag Sukkot, chag, chag, chag, chag Sukkot! Chag Sukkot, chag Sukkot, happy, happy, happy holiday! (end... to you!)

Shake the lulav all around, Left and right and up and down; Smell the etrog, it's so sweet! Celebrate with friends all week! (chorus)

2. We wish one another 'Chag Sameach,' happy holiday. Sing **Chag Samech** with sign language or rhythm sticks. Age appropriate for 3's – 3rd grade.

Shiru shiru shiru chag sameach Lai— lai lai lai— lai lai lai— (repeat) Chag sameach: tap two sticks simultaneously on the ground to the beat; Lai Lai's: tap sticks together Shiru: rub sticks together

3. Ask if the children have visited a sukkah? Show them the teddy bear sukkah and introduce stuffed animal friends. Invite children who brought stuffed animals with them to class that day to put their animals into the sukkah. It's a mitzvah to invite friends into our sukkah! Sing **Come On In**. This is also the perfect song if you are welcoming classes/guests into the sukkah for a Sukkot program.

Take out tool bag and introduce one tool with each verse of **Gonna Build Myself a Sukkah**. This has been very successful with all preschoolers. It's especially fun with rhythm sticks!

Gonna Build Myself a Sukkah

Chop: tap sticks; Saw: rub sticks; Hammer: one stick as the nail, the other taps on it like a hammer; Ladder: use sticks as the rungs of the ladder

5. **Build it Up** is always a hit as well with 4's-3rd graders. For this song, everyone stands in a circle; do body percussion by patting legs just above the knees and gradually moving up the body, getting progressively louder until clapping hands high over-head. Sing the verse, then start back at the knees and build it up again, sing the verse again, then end with the chorus one last time.

6. Now it's time to decorate the sukkah. Pass a basket or bag of laminated fruit/vegetables so each child can select one. Sing **Our Sukkah** as the children hang the fruit on the sukkah. Surprisingly, Kindergarten students enjoyed decorating the sukkah as much as the 2's! A quick way is to get through Our Sukkah is to call the children up in groups based on type of fruit they picked rather than singing each name ("Now we hang some apples...").

7. Show the children the laminated lulav and a lemon fruit shaker (etrog) and explain tradition of shaking them in all directions to show that God is all around. Give a lulav and fruit shaker to each child. Practice shaking in all directions. Sing I Go to the Sukkah (3's-4's) or This is My Lulav (2's). I Go to the Sukkah has a slow part and a fast part. We sway to the slow part, then we shake REALLY fast in all directions on the second part. They think it is hilarious to suddenly start shaking their shakers really fast and then to stop abruptly.

8. Then for more shaking fun, sing **The Lulav Shake** or **I'm a Lulav**, singing the chorus twice through at the beginning so that they can sing along while shaking their lulavs and etrogs... and themselves!

Now it's time to have a **Party in the Sukkah!** Since we've already built and decorated the sukkah AND waved the lulay, skip those verses and start with 'Gonna party in the sukkah...', then invite friends to the sukkah, eat in the sukkah, sleep out in the sukkah... when they are all lying on the floor, snoring, suddenly go back to the 'dance' chorus – the children scramble to their feet in excitement and start dancing again. Very cute!
