


Shake Shake (The Sukkot Lulay)

The word Sukkot means "booths," and refers to the temporary dwellings in which we are commanded to live during this sevenday holiday. The sukkah is a temporary shelter covered with cut branches that commemorates the huts that farmers would build in the fields during harvest time and those of the Israelites as they wandered in the desert for forty years.

A sukkah may take a variety of forms as long as it satisfies a few basic requirements. A sukkah must have at least three walls and the roof must be covered with s'chach, a product of the earth that is no longer attached to the earth, such as tree branches. The s'chach should provide more shade than sunlight in the daytime, yet allow the brightest stars to be visible at night.

It is a mitzvah to wave the lulav every day during Sukkot. The proper time is in the morning, either before the morning service or during the service immediately before Hallel, songs of praise to God. Stand facing east, hold the lulav in front of you and shake it three times, then to your right, over your shoulder, to your left, up above you, and then towards the ground.
